Turkey invites Greece to resume talks on Mediterranean (AnsaMed)

Turkish Foreign Minister Mevlut Cavusoglu said "we invite Greece in January to hold the first meeting" of explorative talks agreed in September to try to solve disputes on sovereignty in the eastern Mediterranean, said Turkish Foreign Minister Mevlut Cavusoglu, at the end of a joint press conference with the head of diplomacy of the Turkish-Cypriot community, Tahsin Ertugruloglu.
