Every year, 600 000 tonnes of plastic end up in the Mediterranean Sea. France is the largest producer of plastic waste in the region and has a lower recycling rate than its European neighbors. It recycles only 24%. On average that's 16% less than Spain, Italy and the United Kingdom. Read more <u>here</u>.

With 46,000 km of coasts, the Mediterranean Sea is a semi-enclosed sea surrounded by a large number of countries.
