Tensions in Spain's Coalition Government Flare up over Labour Reform (The Local)

Tensions in Spain's leftist coalition government flared Monday over a promised reform of a landmark 2012 labour reform, with the two ruling parties split over the scope of the proposed changes. Read more here.
