PM says Greece open to dialogue with Turkey, despite provocations (Ekathimerini)

A day after Turkish President Tayyip Erdogan issued a thinly-veiled threat to take military action against Greece, Greek Prime Minister Kyriakos Mitsotakis said his country is open to a dialogue with the neighboring country. Read more here.

President Recep Tayyip Erdoğan met Armenia's Prime Minister Nikol Pashinyan yesterday (October 6) in what was the first meeting of the government leaders of the two countries in 13 years. Read more here.

Fleeing Lebanon to escape poverty: At least 100 die in migrant shipwreck (France 24)

Three years into Lebanon's devastating financial collapse, some 80 percent of the population is now living below the poverty line. The situation is driving more and more people to risk their lives on the open seas. Last month, at least a hundred people drowned when a migrant boat capsized off the Syrian coast.
